The directors / trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2023.

Principal Activity

Established in 1991 by John Scott, Rince agus Damhsa Cuídeachta faoi Theorainn Rátháiochta (CTR) t/a Irish Modern Dance Theatre aims to provide a programme of physically and culturally diverse dance productions using performers of varying styles, ages and backgrounds. Based in Dublin, the company is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on a non-profit-distributing basis. The company has been given charitable status by the Irish Revenue authorities and since 2014 is a registered charity by virtue of the Charities Act, 2009.

2023 Activities

In 2023, the company performed live work. The company's Strategic Policy, 2021-2024, identifies three areas of priority, pointing to clear goals and objectives: (i) to create virtuosic dance; (ii) to enable increasing numbers to access and enjoy dance; and (iii) to ensure that IMDT has the capacity to deliver on its ambitions.

One new work was created during 2023: *Migration Sonata* commissioned by and premiered as part of the Kilkenny Arts Festival in August. *Migration Sonata* continued to reflect the company's longstanding Equality-Diversity-Inclusion policy by providing performance opportunities to five Ukrainian refugees based in Kilkenny and various workshop opportunities for up to 20 Ukrainian refugees.

Heroes had a three-venue national and international tour, performed in March at the CHQ Building, Dublin as part of Five Lamps Arts Festival; in July during PeaceDance Festival in Osnabrück, Germany; and in October as part of Dance Cork Firkin Crane winter programme.

Divine Madness performed as part of the Five Lamps Arts Festival in March and in July as part of the Clonmel Junction Arts Festival. There was a single performance of ACTIONS (now) as part of Tipperary Dance International Festival.

Dancer from the Dance Festival of Irish Choreography took place again in July in Dublin at Project Arts Centre, Irish Film Institute and Dance Ireland, with master classes, workshops, panel discussions, live performances, and dance films.

Four Associate Artists were supported in 2023 and workshops took place with clients from Spirasi Ireland, which provides support services for asylum seekers and refugees who are survivors of torture.

Over the twelve months, employment was provided to 21 dancers who were engaged for approximately 265 rehearsal / performance days. In addition, 20 dancers and choreographers were engaged during the Dancer from the Dance Festival.

Financial Results

The surplus/(deficit) for the financial year after providing for depreciation amounted to €1,408 (2022 - €(6,323)).

At the end of the financial year, the company has assets of €111,701 (2022 - €100,282) and liabilities of €93,102 (2022 - €83,091). The net assets of the company have increased by €1,408.

The directors are aware of the major risks to which the company is exposed, in particular its heavy reliance on continued Arts Council funding. While satisfied that, broadly speaking, procedures are in place to mitigate the company's exposure to such risks, the directors have agreed procedures for adopting a more systematic approach to the assessment of risk.

The directors make regular assessments of what is required to ensure the continuance of the company's operations. They have agreed a Reserves Policy that outlines the extent to which unrestricted funds, not subject to future commitments, can be put aside.

Events post-year end

There have been no significant events affecting the company since the year-end.

Future Developments

The company will continue to promote dance through innovative dance expressions and by introducing high quality international dance practitioners to Irish audiences and professionals.

The auditors, Broc Accounting Services Limited have indicated their willingness to continue in office in accordance with the provisions of section 383(2) of the Companies Act 2014.

Accounting Records

To ensure that adequate accounting records are kept in accordance with sections 281 to 285 of the Companies Act 2014, the directors have employed appropriately qualified accounting personnel and have maintained appropriate computerised accounting systems. The accounting records are located at the residence of the Finance Manager, Dublin

Report on the audit of the financial statements

We have audited the financial statements of Rince agus Damhsa Cuideachta Faoi Theorainn Ráthaíochta T/A Irish Modern Dance Theatre ('the company') for the financial year ended 31 December 2023 which comprise the Income and Expenditure Account, the Statement of Financial Position, the Reconciliation of Members' Funds, the Cash Flow Statement and the related notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish Law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" issued in the United Kingdom by the Financial Reporting Council.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the company as at 31 December 2023 and of its surplus for the financial year then ended;

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the financial year ended 31 December 2023

1. General Information

Rince agus Damhsa Cuideachta Faoi Theorainn Ráthaíochta T/A Irish Modern Dance Theatre is a company limited by guarantee incorporated in the Republic of Ireland. Multi-media Building, 2 Curved Street, Dublin, D02 PC43 is the registered office, which is also the principal place of business of the company.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2023 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" (FRS 102).

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

The company qualifies as a small company as defined by section 280A of the Companies Act 2014 in respect of the financial year, and has applied the rules of the 'Small Companies Regime' in accordance with section 280C of the Companies Act 2014.

Income

Income comprises grants, donations and the value of services supplied by the company.

Tangible assets and depreciation

Tangible assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Computer Equipment

- 25% Straight line

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts except where the effect of discounting would be immaterial. In such cases the receivables are stated at cost less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Taxation

The company has been granted charitable status by the Revenue Commissioners and as such is exempt from any charge to corporation tax.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the Statement of Financial Position date. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the rates of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined. The resulting exchange differences are dealt with in the Income and Expenditure Account.

3. Departure from Companies Act 2014 Presentation

The directors have elected to present an Income and Expenditure Account instead of a Profit and Loss Account in these financial statements as this company is a not-for-profit entity.
